

ABOUT A BOAT

What is the deal with those really long rowing shells anyways? Well did you know

that the "eight-man" rowing shells are an average of 60-65 feet in length (depending on weight category) and weigh as much as 200lbs? The boat length must increase to accommodate space requirements and buoyancy for each additional body (and thus increased total boat weight). Originally, shells were made with wooden decking and a thin layer of wood fitted

Email Dan at <u>pyrite2357@gmail.com</u> with your name and request, and he will send you a custom report. over it as a "shell". Hence we call them "rowing shells" today. These large wooden boats were rowed for decades until composite materials came onto the scene. Boats started to be made using a mixture of wooden decking (or "guts") with a fiberglass shell fitted over it. Skeptics doubted the value of fiberglass originally, and with good reason. Today most racing shells are made from "carbon fiber" (fiberglass) composites and have allowed crews to win with incredible speed. But, they still pale in comparison to the longevity of the wooden hull. Newer composite shells will lose their "stiffness" much faster than a wooden shell, and stiffness is important to maintain efficiency of the stroke that transfers human power into boat speed though the water. Hence, wooden boats may often not be as competitive with newer shells due to their weight, but will maintain a much longer useful life than newer composite hulls. Kind of like new cars!
